

## Rambles from the President

For years (apparently long before I moved here six years ago), Oaklanders wanting to build or remodel on the hill have heard conflicting stories from Oakland zoning and planning personnel. There was a moratorium on new construction, or there wasn't. Renovations could be made, provided you did not add a bedroom, or perhaps that was a bathroom. No new septic systems could be built, or perhaps they could if they employed certain new technologies. The responsibility for determining whether construction, renovation, or remodeling could take place rested with the City; no, make that the County.

It now seems that the Alameda County Department of Environmental Health (ACEH) and the Oakland Building Department have come together to clarify these issues, although some uncertainties remain.

If my interpretation of these policies is correct, there is not a moratorium on new construction or major renovations on the Oakland side of Panoramic Hill -- there is an outright prohibition.

The county has issued a document titled: "Draft Onsite Wastewater Treatment System Ordinance - October 2005". This draft ordinance, expected to be

finalized shortly, together with Chapter 15.04 of the City of Oakland Amendments to the California Plumbing Code (CPC) indicate rather unambiguously what is and what is not permitted. Representatives from ACEH will be at our next General Meeting, to be held March 12th, to describe the new ordinance, explain how it affects us, and answer our questions about it.

In the interim, I have attempted to summarize in this column some of the key features, as I understand them. Alameda County officials interpret the Oakland code, in part, as follows:

"New septic systems will not be allowed on vacant land or on properties that were not previously served by septic systems" (Section 713.3).

"Existing septic systems will not be permitted to expand to accommodate additional wastewater load" (Sections 713.3 and 713.5).

"When a proposal is made to enlarge a dwelling or add a secondary dwelling on a property served by a septic system the (Oakland) Building Department will refer the applicant to (ACEH). We will review the plans to determine whether additional bedrooms (or potential bedrooms) are proposed. We will also determine whether nonbedroom expansions are of such size and scope that addition wastewater load may be placed on the septic system. We will provide a statement as to the adequacy of the existing septic system for the proposed building which is based on the current Alameda County General Ordinance governing septic systems" (Section 713.2).

"A building permit for expansion of a dwelling or addition of a secondary dwelling on a property served by a septic system will not be issued until the applicant provides a stamped plan from (ACEH) indicating that the septic system does not need to be enlarged or upgraded" (Sections 713.4 and 713.5).

So where might there be room for interpretation or uncertainty? The County has prepared, and relies upon its "Additions and Remodels Policy" to determine whether a particular proposal will be permitted. The policy includes guidelines that link the size of additions,



## An Open Letter to the Panoramic Hill Community

Several neighbors attended a joint meeting of four Berkeley Commissions on February 22nd at which the University made a presentation of its Southeast Campus Integrated Projects. At each of these meetings a little more information becomes available.

The University will be

holding a stadium open house and tours beginning at 5:45 PM, Monday, March 13. I urge all PHA members and hill residents to attend (1) for their own information, and (2) to ask the University's planning team and/or coaches about the actual elevations above the stadium rim for the press box and seating, planned elevation increases on the east side, stadium lighting, the size

and actual footprint of the student athlete center on the west side of the stadium, the elevation of the 850 car parking garage at Maxwell Field and points of ingress and egress, and anything else that one might ask. Our continued presence is very important as this process moves forward!

renovations and remodels (expressed as a percentage of the existing square footage) to the required Class of Septic System (also defined in the policy statement). Some of the language in this document seems open to interpretation, such as the term "major alteration of living area." Also, the approach taken to measure the existing square footage of a

dwelling may also be subject to debate.

But the bottom line now seems clear. Existing Oakland ordinances, supported by review, when deemed necessary, by the County Department of Environmental Health, will likely prohibit the construction of new dwellings on Panoramic Hill lots not served by sewers,

and will greatly restrict the ability of a homeowner to expand, renovate, or remodel an existing home if the County's formulae indicate that the result will be an increase, or the future potential to increase, the wastewater load on the existing septic system.

Please come to the General Meeting on March 12<sup>th</sup> to learn more.

## January Rains Cause Major Slide on Hill

In early January, a large (5-tree) mudslide covered the Upper Jordan Trail about 1/2mile east of the water tank, making it inconvenient for joggers and impassible for fire engines. In his e-mail informing us of the closure, Tom Klatt, head of the Campus OES, pointed out that with more rain the mudslide might continue on down to the Lower Jordan Trail, which could leave us with only Panoramic Way for emergency vehicles. The Berkelev Fire Department was informed and the slide was cleared by UC within two weeks.

## PHA Responds UC Development plans

PHA President Jerry Wachtel recently sent a seven-page letter to the UC's Principal Planner for Capital Projects, commenting on the University's Notice of Preparation of a "Tiered Focused Environmental Impact Report - Southeast Campus Integrated Projects." Although the letter is too long to be included in this newsletter, we have provided excerpts below. You can find the complete letter on the PHA website.

After discussing some general concerns, including the University's need to be open and honest with affected communities in its dealings about this critical issue, the vague language that permeates the notice making reasonable review impossible, and the

expectation that promises made to the Panoramic Hill community by Chancellors past and present about Memorial Stadium uses will be kept, Jerry's letter went on to discuss a number of specific community concerns. These included: noise; lighting; public safety; design, aesthetics and the historic structure: impact of the stadium on the Panoramic Hill National Historic District; and property values on Panoramic Hill.

Following a discussion of each of these concerns in turn, the letter then turned to providing specific comments to individual sections of the University's Notice. The sections addressed were:

Aesthetics; Cultural Resources; Geology, Seismicity and Soils; Noise; Public Services; and Transportation and Traffic.

Jerry's letter concluded by saying: "We look forward to working closely with the University in the months ahead in an effort to produce a SCIP that will work for all."

Although we have received no response to this letter, the University will be holding a "community open house" at the Stadium this Monday, March 13<sup>th</sup>. You can read about this event elsewhere in this newsletter, and it will be discussed at the PHA General Meeting on Sunday March 12<sup>th</sup>. But

note that this is a rare, and potentially very valuable opportunity to learn more about what UC is planning in Panoramic Hill's front yard, and to ask the hard questions about how these massive developments and expansions of the Southeast Campus may affect us for generations to come. Please attend, and please be heard.

## Power Pole Left Hanging After Mudslide



The hill was plagued by several mudslides after heavy late December rains. This one across from 3444 Dwight Way left a recently installed power pole hanging in mid air. Concerned neighbors promptly called PG&E who stabilized the pole the next morning. Within two weeks the pole was relocated.

Other slides include the major slide on the Upper Jordon Trail as well as slides at the third hairpin on Panoramic way, a minor slide near 567 Panoramic Way, and a minor slide that blocked the driveway of 435 Panoramic.

During the fire season residents are required to clear brush, however, be careful not to leave land barren and susceptible to land slide. Replace vegetation with fire safe vegetation:

# PHA Responds to Berkeley's Proposed Changes to the Landmarks Preservation Ordinance

Dear Mayor and Council members:

I write to express my opposition to any action that might be taken to weaken the Landmarks Preservation Ordinance (LPO), an ordinance that has served the City and its residents well for more than 30 years.

As you may be aware, the lower section of our Panoramic Hill community was recently added to the National Register of Historic Places. This honor resulted from the diligent work of a number of our neighbors, and we learned a great deal about historic preservation during this process. The importance, not just of unique and significant structures, but of other buildings and their occupants, paths, and the natural landscape all contribute to the integrity of this special community

Thus, on Panoramic Hill we know, first hand, that the preservation of the City's historic resources contributes significantly to the area's quality of life and to its desirability as a place to live, work and shop. By weakening this ordinance, you will likely cause irreparable harm to the character of many Berkeley neighborhoods – once a historic structure is lost, it can never be replaced, and the coherence of the community in which it stood will be forever damaged.

I understand that your proposed actions will take three forms. First, by eliminating the category of "Structure of Merit," you will adversely impact any neighborhood in which such structures contribute to the "sense of place." This would be a serious mistake with citywide consequences. Second, by preempting the current public initiation process, you will open the door to speculators and developers whose sole interest in a property may be the profit motive, and these people will eventually come to dominate and control the process. And third, by creating a staff Preservation Officer, you will usurp the authority of a commission that is now accountable to the public. I strongly disagree with each of these three proposals, and urge you to reject them.

Finally, these proposed revisions to the LPO have apparently moved forward with little, if any, public input or even awareness. Since your proposed changes to the Ordinance are contrary to the City's 2002 General Plan, we believe that these proposals should be allowed full public review and debate as required by the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA).
